

STEM INFUSED Literacy:

A KSLA Brandywine Event at CCIU

Emily Trace, Ryan Kaiser, and Amy Crider from Greencastle-Antrim School District delivered an incredible hands-on workshop on Saturday, October 15th at the CCIU from 9 to noon. They work together to find simple ways to find simple and effective ways to incorporate STEM into literacy instruction, often using authentic and diverse mentor texts.

The team defined STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) as:

- Authentic learning experiences
- Hands-on explanation
- Asking questions
- Noticing things & making connections in real time
- Fun! Engaging learning!

Emily, Amy, and Ryan provided a solid rationale for STEM infused literacy. STEM amplifies students' learning, builds vocabulary, fosters teamwork and collaboration, and helps students engage in creative thinking and problem solving. It builds resilience and determination in students while giving them myriad opportunities to experiment and try out new things. STEM makes cross-curricular connections and deepens students' self-knowledge as well as their understanding of others' perspectives.

Emily and Amy have secured a grant which allows them to work in local libraries, YMCAs, and with preservice teachers at Shippensburg as well as pushing into classrooms in their school district to work with teachers and students to build STEM infused literacy opportunities into their experiences for this year. They hope opportunities will be expanded into the following years. Amy is a K-2 librarian and Emily serves the district as a K-2 STEM teacher. Ryan is a 4th grade learning lab teacher and is certified in gamification and project -based learning.

At the Saturday session, we formed teams of four and were given the task to build a tower using a rubber band with four strings attached. We were told not to touch the rubber band or cups with our hands. We could only manipulate the string we held. Halfway through the rule changed, and we could gesture but not talk to each other. It was so engaging! After time was called, we talked about the value of reflection, oral and/or written. The team asked us to consider these questions with our students:

- Where did you have to use collaboration? Creativity? Communication? Critical thinking skills?
- What would you change? What could you change?
- What is your goal?
- How did you get there?





Ryan talked about authentic texts for STEM and said they do not have to be STEM related to connect with a STEM lesson. One example was *Our Table* by Peter Reynolds. So much can be done with this book to plan with cross-curricular intention. Students can work with manipulatives to do many of the activities listed here:

- family and feelings
- engineering and building
- balancing objects on a table
- food groups and counting
- comparing shapes of tables
- · testing the stability of the table you build
- introduce perimeter and area
- research cultural traditions
- invite a speaker to talk about historical traditions around a table
- code a robot to travel under your table






Participants had a chance to talk with the facilitators on a one-on-one basis while we traveled around the room to view containers filled with manipulatives and examine the collection of picture books that work well with STEM infused literacy and cross-curricular activities. Educators were very enthusiastic about this workshop and suggested that we bring them back again. They were recommended for KSLA Conference 2023 in Hershey. It was a morning well spent! The pandemic forced us to ignore the 2020 award so this year at our first in-person meeting at CCIU, we honored one board member for 2020 and one for 2022. Each received an engraved clock. Both are enthusiastic advocates for literacy and continue to spread the word about this worthy group of educators.

BABY BOOK PROJECT (Montgomery County)

Parents of newborns at Einstein Hospital receive a new book and parent brochure with tips about reading to their child.

COURT CHILD CARE CENTER (Montgomery County)

Drop-in childcare provides an alternative to children living the experience of courtroom business first-hand. KSLA Brandywine Valley Forge supports the learning center with the donation of reading materials for children from infancy through school-age.

CHILDREN'S LITERACY OUTREACH (Chester County)

KSLA Brandywine Valley Forge supports two community service projects through distribution of books. Books are provided to children and mothers residing in a local shelter sponsored by Friends Association. Books are also distributed to CVIM (Community Volunteers in Medicine) for their waiting area. Donations of gently used books and monetary contributions to purchase new books are gratefully accepted.

PRESCHOOL LITERACY PROJECT (Berks, Chester County, and Montgomery)

This ongoing project supports KSLA's "Keystone to Reading Book Award". This year, for the first time, the project is expanding into both Berks and Montgomery counties. Retired KSLA Brandywine Valley Forge members visit preschools and kindergartens to introduce books and collect children's votes.

YOUNG PARENTS PROGRAM (Chester County)

The Chester County Intermediate Unit's Young Parents program provides support services to pregnant and parenting students. One of the services includes instruction in child development. KSLA Brandywine Valley Forge is in the planning stages of developing a partnership with the CCIU's Young Parents Program to help highlight the benefits of literacy in early childhood through the distribution of baby board books and pamphlets on the importance of reading to your child.




Annette T. Rabin Scholarship



Book Recommendations


Hollow Fires by Samira Ahmed

Fifty-Four Things Wrong With Gwendolyn Rogers – Caela Carter

Quill Tree Books/HarperCollins (2021)

Fiction; Ages 11-13

"Gwendolyn knows she shouldn't have opened the school assessment about her behavior, but because she did, she knows there's nothing actually wrong with her. She's just a lazy, socially inept, defiant, whiny 11-year-old girl—not to mention the other 50 items on the report that she writes down and studies. Gwendolyn can't ever remember her pencil, forgets her homework, lashes out violently, and she's always, always in trouble. She feels balanced when she's with horses, but she's lost horse privileges ever since she had a scary, unexpected tantrum following the advice of a terrible therapist. At least she's got Tyler, the half brother she only recently learned about. Tyler's got a diagnosis of ADHD but still sometimes acts out despite treatment. But how come the teachers never call Tyler's mom when he's bad? Or the moms of any of the misbehaving boys, for that matter? Why are teachers so unhelpful and sarcastic? Gwendolyn's mother finally gets her a good therapist, and as Dr. Nessa walks them through diagnosis, bad medication reactions, adaptation, and fighting ableism, their pain and epiphanies are gut-wrenchingly genuine..."





Words to Make a Friend: A Story in Japanese and English

Donna Jo Napoli and Naoko Stoop Random House Studio (2021); Ages 4-7

Readers might be tempted to flip past the front matter to the start of the story. But take time to linger over the evocative endpapers that show a big yellow moving truck parked outside a blue and white house in a snowy landscape. An adult and a child, both with pale skin and black hair, are standing on the porch, about to open the door. Turn the page, and there is another adult-and-child pair, both with brown skin and dark hair, bringing their new neighbors a gift of food. Like many friendships, this story builds slowly, one interaction at a time, urging readers to savor each moment. The first child speaks Japanese and the second, English; yet their intent and interactions are seemingly understood, facilitated by snowy-day play and bilingual conversation. Eventually the cold pushes them inside to enjoy Japanese tea, a treat, and origami. Stoop's captivating mixed-media illustrations depict dramatic perspectives even in the kids' first meeting, their bold, bright figures striking against a pastel snowy scene. Napoli's spare text trusts primarily English-speaking readers to derive sufficient meaning from the bilingual spreads while lacking the scaffolding to facilitate deeper cultural comprehension for both kids. Notes from author and illustrator each offer depth and background as well as insight into their artistic partnership.

Mad, Bad and Dangerous to Know - Samira Ahmed Soho Teen (2020)
Ages 14+



Khayyam Maquet, a 17-year-old rising high school senior, wallows in self-pity during her family's annual summer trip to Paris.

Her failed essay contest entry chasing a theory about a lost Delacroix painting gifted to Alexandre Dumas dashed her hopes of impressing her dream art school. When Khayyam perhaps too coincidentally meets the sixth-great-grandson of Dumas himself, also called Alexandre Dumas, they embark on a quest to find the lost painting of a mysterious raven-haired woman. The narration alternates between Khayyam, a conflicted teen who falls for present-day Alexandre while she is still hung up on her noncommittal boyfriend back home in Chicago, and Leila, the beautiful, mystical Muslim subject of the painting who lived during the 19th century as a concubine to an Ottoman pasha and yearned for freedom and to be with her true love. Ahmed (Internment, 2019, etc.) explores weighty themes including Orientalism, women silenced by history, and the responsibility of sharing their unheard voices as Khayyam grapples with who has the right to tell someone's story. Familiar teen romance and angst, including flip-flopping on feelings and motivations, mix with academic discoveries and intrigue in this fast-paced, if at times dense, mystery.
